Global Issues in Context is a new electronic resource that offers global perspectives on issues of international importance and current world events and topics in the news related to these issues. Not a pro and con database, *Global Issues in Context* ties together a variety of sources to present a rich analysis of issues – social, political, military, economic, environmental, science related, health related, cultural – and headlines in world hot spots. It provides information seekers with a framework to better understand 21st-century issues and events while highlighting global connections and the interdependence of all nations.

Global Issues in Context focuses on broad issues, such as **war, genocide, terrorism, human rights, poverty, famine, globalization, world trade, nuclear proliferation, and global warming**, as well as more specific events and topics in the news that are related to these broader issues.

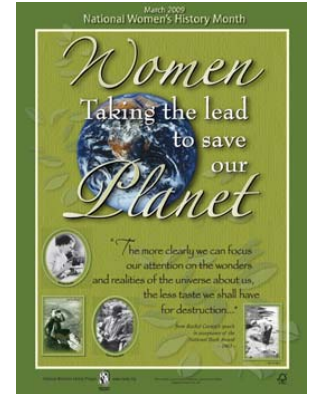
